Guide to Race and Ethnicity Reporting for AP[®] Online Score Reports

EFFECTIVE JULY 11, 2016

INTRODUCTION

In July 2016, the Advanced Placement Program[®] (AP[®]) moved to a two-part race and ethnicity question to align with U.S. Department of Education guidelines and better serve our schools and districts. This affects the following reports in the AP Online Score Reports for Educators portal:

- Student Datafile
- School Summary by Student Demographics
- District Summary by Student Demographics

The expanded race and ethnicity subcategories, as outlined by federal guidelines, allow your school or district to more easily apply policies related to race, calculate diversity, and generate federal reporting. These changes also align with the reporting practices for other College Board assessments, including the PSAT/NMSQT[®] and the SAT[®]. Although the updates were not extensive, your institution may need to evaluate how to interpret and bridge data from prior year administrations with more recent administration data. Review this guide with your internal technical/operations department and/or vendor.

STUDENT DATAFILE—SUMMARY OF CHANGES

The student datafile is a downloadable CSV (comma-separated value) file containing student score report data for each AP student in your school or district who tested in a

specific exam administration. This information can be viewed within Excel or uploaded to other systems for internal analysis and planning.

In the student datafile, two new fields were added at the end of the student record to accommodate the updated two-part question:

1. **"Race/Ethnicity Student Response 2016 and Forward"** (column #243) contains the original response(s) provided by the student. Schools and districts may use this data in the application of any bridging methodologies for trend analysis, as recommended by the U.S. Department of Education.
2. **"Derived Aggregate Race Ethnicity 2016 and Forward"** (column #244) contains the derived aggregate reporting category based on U.S. Department of Education guidelines.

These fields will only be populated for the 2016 exam administration and forward. If viewing a report for the 2015 exam administration or earlier, these fields will be blank and you should refer to the original **"Ethnic Group"** field (column #19) for race/ethnicity data. For your convenience, we have created an AP Student Datafile Layout Crosswalk that compares the prior values with the new values. The crosswalk is included at the end of this guide (Appendix A), along with the complete AP Student Datafile Layout (Appendix B).

Additional items to note:

- 2015 and prior versions of the race and ethnicity field on the AP answer sheet included an **"Other"** option; therefore, we will continue to report this option until all students have answered the new two-part question.
- The original **"Ethnic Group"** field (column #19) remains in the layout and will reflect the student's race/ethnicity if the student datafile is being run for the 2015 exam administration or a prior administration. The field name has been renamed **"Ethnic Group 2015 and Prior."**
- While the student datafile contains a student's historical AP score data (if applicable), the demographic information (i.e., address, race/ethnicity, etc.) reflects what the student provided at the time of the administration for which the report is being run. For example, if a student tested in 2014, 2015, and 2016, their record in the 2016 student datafile would contain scores for all three administrations and all demographic information would be representative of what was collected at the time of the May 2016 administration.

Figure A shows the original race and ethnicity question used in the 2015 and prior exam administrations in which a student could only select one value. **Figure B** shows how the race and ethnicity question currently appears today. In this example, the student completed the new questions by selecting that they are “Not of Hispanic, Latino, or Spanish origin,” while also indicating that they are multiracial by selecting “White” and “Black.” In the new field, **“Race Ethnicity Student Response 2016 and Forward”** (column #243), the student response will be reported in the 11-character string “NNNNYNNYNYN” where positions 5, 8, and 10 are populated with a “Y” to represent the student’s selections. In the new field, **“Derived Aggregate Race Ethnicity 2016 and Forward”** (column #244), the student will be reported as “Two or more races, non-Hispanic” with code 12.

School Summary by Student Demographics and District Summary by Student Demographics

The School Summary by Student Demographics and the District Summary by Student Demographics reports summarize AP Exams and scores in a school or district by students’ grade level, ethnicity, gender, or fee reduction status. Beginning with the 2016 exam administration, the race and ethnicity reporting categories in these reports were updated to align with U.S. Department of Education reporting guidelines. Note that

reports for the 2015 and prior administrations will continue to apply the original reporting categories. For details, see table below.

CHECKLIST FOR IMPLEMENTATION

Although the College Board has made every effort to minimize the impact on schools and districts, your institution may still need to evaluate how to interpret and bridge data from prior year administrations with more recent administration data. Users are strongly advised to **be cautious** when making comparisons between the 2015 and the prior year(s) race/ethnicity subgroup data with more recent administration data because of changes in the way the data are collected and reported. For any trend analysis, users are encouraged to apply bridging methodologies where applicable as recommended by the U.S. Department of Education. To aid in this, the collected student responses are in the student datafile. Please refer to the U.S. Department of Education and the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) recommendations for additional guidance on bridging methodologies.

The checklist below provides some general ideas to consider as you analyze your data. Review this with your technical/operations department and/or vendor.

- ✓ Review the AP Student Datafile Layout Crosswalk in Appendix A to identify impacted fields.
- ✓ Do your systems use the race/ethnicity fields from the AP score reports? If so:
 - ✓ Identify new race/ethnicity fields that may need to be created.
 - ✓ Decide how to capture data from the old race/ethnicity question.
 - ✓ Decide how your school or district will handle documenting race/ethnicity for students from previous administrations (2015, 2014, etc.).
- ✓ Do you use data from the race/ethnicity fields from the AP score reports in any of your reporting?
 - ✓ Identify if any reports contain year-over-year trend data.
 - ✓ Decide how to bridge data across multiple years.
