
Increasing the number of students who graduate from high school ready for college and career is a unifying priority for educators from every state. The College Board believes that its programs can be a platform to expand access to opportunities — through scholarships, challenging course work, fee waivers, and much more — and to propel students into college and career. Our programs — PSAT/NMSOT[°], SAT[°], and AP[°] — work together to provide actionable results, drive instructional next steps for individual students, and provide targeted policies for states and districts. Below is a summary of the 2014-15 PSAT/NMSOT, SAT, and AP participation and performance results in Alabama.¹

ALL SCHOOLS' PARTICIPATION RESULTS

PSAT/NMSQT°

In 2014, 25,497 students benefited from taking the PSAT/NMSOT, compared to 25,524 in 2013 and 32,238 in 2010.

→ 21.8% were underrepresented minority students, compared to 22.2% in 2013 and 31.0% in 2010.



→ Last October, **16.1%** of 10th-graders and **22.0%** of 11th-graders took the PSAT/NMSQT.²



SAT

In Alabama, 2,929 or 6.1% of students from the class of 2015 took the SAT, compared to 3,172 students (6.7%) in last year's graduating class and 3,664 (7.5%) in the class of 2011.³

→ 26.2% were underrepresented minority students, compared to 25.8% in 2014 and 23.4% in 2011.




→ 14.5% took the test using a fee waiver, compared to 13.5% in 2014 and 9.3% of the class of 2011.

In Alabama, 26,383 students took an AP Exam in 2015, compared to 25,001 in 2014 and 17,084 in 2011.

→ 22.4% were underrepresented minority students, compared to 23.7% in 2014 and 21.9% in 2011.



→ 18.0% were low-income students, compared to 18.2% in 2014 and 11.8% in 2011.

In Alabama, students took 47,931 AP Exams in 2015, compared to 45,434 in 2014 and 29,715 in 2011.



PSAT/NMSQT[®]


In Alabama, 5,901 (57.9%) 10th-grade PSAT/NMSOT $^{\circ}$ takers in 2014 were on track for college readiness.

- → 28.2% of 10th-grade African American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 36.7% of 10th-grade Hispanic PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 50.8% of 10th-grade Native American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.



In Alabama, 7,035 (57.4%) 11th-grade PSAT/NMSQT[®] takers in 2014 were on track for college readiness.

- → 27.1% of 11th-grade African American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 43.5% of 11th-grade Hispanic PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 50.0% of 11th-grade Native American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.


PSAT/NMSOT takers in 2014 demonstrated potential to succeed in at least one AP course, including 2,063 in an AP STEM subject.

In Alabama, 430 underrepresented minority 10th-grade PSAT/NMSOT takers showed potential for AP success, including 139 in an AP STEM subject.

SAT

In Alabama, 1,713 (58.5%) SAT takers in the class of 2015 met the SAT College and Career Readiness Benchmark.

- → 24.8% of African American SAT takers met the benchmark.
- → 68.2% of Hispanic SAT takers met the benchmark.
- → 40.0% of Native American SAT takers met the benchmark.



AP

In Alabama, 10,940 students scored 3 or higher on an AP° Exam in 2015, compared to 10,242 in 2014 and 8,007 in 2011.

- → 41.5% of AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam in May 2015.
- → 17.8% of African American AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam.
- → 40.1% of Hispanic AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam.
- → 35.3% of Native American AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam.
