Increasing the number of students who graduate from high school ready for college and career is a unifying priority for educators from every state. The College Board believes that its programs can be a platform to expand access to opportunities through scholarships, challenging course work, fee waivers, and much more — and to propel students into college and career. Our programs — PSAT/NMSQT°, SAT°, and AP° — work together to provide actionable results, drive instructional next steps for individual students, and provide targeted policies for states and districts. Below is a summary of the 2014-15 PSAT/NMSOT, SAT, and AP participation and performance results in Hawaii.1

ALL SCHOOLS' PARTICIPATION RESULTS

PSAT/NMSQT°

In 2014, 13,512 students benefited from taking the PSAT/NMSOT, compared to 13,738 in 2013 and 18,476 in 2010.

- → 5.0% were underrepresented minority students, compared to 5.3% in 2013 and 5.2% in 2010.
 - **5.0**% 2014
 - **5.3**% 2013
 - **5.2**% 2010
- → Last October, 30.4% of 10th-graders and 42.8% of 11th-graders took the PSAT/NMSQT.2

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SAT

In Hawaii, 7,888 or 61.4% of students from the class of 2015 took the SAT, compared to 8,211 students (62.6%) in last year's graduating class and 8,731 (63.5%) in the class of 2011.3

- → 7.1% were underrepresented minority students, compared to 6.6% in 2014 and 6.0% in 2011.
 - **7.1%** 2015
 - **6.6**% 2014
 - **6.0**% 2011
- → 25.4% took the test using a fee waiver, compared to 23.9% in 2014 and 20.0% of the class of 2011.



In Hawaii, 8,263 students took an AP Exam in 2015, compared to 7,683 in 2014 and 6,517 in 2011.

- → 5.5% were underrepresented minority students, compared to 6.0% in 2014 and 4.6% in 2011.
 - **5.5**% 2015
 - **6.0**% 2014
 - **4.6**% 2011
- → 17.7% were low-income students, compared to 18.1% in 2014 and 14.4% in 2011.

In Hawaii, students took 13,122 AP Exams in 2015, compared to 11,969 in 2014 and 10,249 in 2011.




ALL SCHOOLS' PERFORMANCE RESULTS

PSAT/NMSQT°


In Hawaii, 2,646 (54.3%) 10th-grade PSAT/NMSOT® takers in 2014 were on track for college readiness.

- → 46.7% of 10th-grade African American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 40.3% of 10th-grade Hispanic PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 43.5% of 10th-grade Native American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.



In Hawaii, 3,049 (49.6%) 11th-grade PSAT/NMSOT® takers in 2014 were on track for college readiness.

- → 38.6% of 11th-grade African American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 38.0% of 11th-grade Hispanic PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 47.6% of 11th-grade Native American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.



In Hawaii, 1,948 10th-grade PSAT/NMSOT takers in 2014 demonstrated potential to succeed in at least one AP course, including 1,032 in an AP STEM subject.


In Hawaii, 78 underrepresented minority 10th-grade PSAT/NMSQT takers showed potential for AP success, including 37 in an AP STEM subject.



SAT

In Hawaii, 2,998 (38.0%) SAT takers in the class of 2015 met the SAT College and Career Readiness Benchmark.

- → 27.5% of African American SAT takers met the benchmark.
- → 32.2% of Hispanic SAT takers met the benchmark.
- → 40.4% of Native American SAT takers met the benchmark.





In Hawaii, 4,347 students scored 3 or higher on an AP® Exam in 2015, compared to 4,136 in 2014 and 3,625 in 2011.

- → 52.6% of AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam in May 2015.
- → 36.9% of African American AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam.
- → 45.6% of Hispanic AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam.
- → 47.4% of Native American AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam.
