



Increasing the number of students who graduate from high school ready for college and career is a unifying priority for educators from every state. The College Board believes that its programs can be a platform to expand access to opportunities through scholarships, challenging course work, fee waivers, and much more — and to propel students into college and career. Our programs — PSAT/NMSQT°, SAT°, and AP° — work together to provide actionable results, drive instructional next steps for individual students, and provide targeted policies for states and districts. Below is a summary of the 2014-15 PSAT/NMSOT, SAT, and AP participation and performance results in Iowa.<sup>1</sup>

#### ALL SCHOOLS' PARTICIPATION RESULTS

## PSAT/NMSQT°

In 2014, 11,659 students benefited from taking the PSAT/NMSOT, compared to 11,158 in 2013 and 11,329 in 2010.

- → 6.7% were underrepresented minority students, compared to 5.4% in 2013 and 4.3% in 2010.
  - **6.7%** 2014
  - **5.4**% 2013
  - **4.3**% 2010
- → Last October, 9.9% of 10th-graders and 20.1% of 11th-graders took the PSAT/NMSQT.2

### SAT

In Iowa, 986 or 2.9% of students from the class of 2015 took the SAT, compared to 1,041 students (3.1%) in last year's graduating class and 1,254 (3.5%) in the class of 2011.

- → 10.1% were underrepresented minority students, compared to 8.3% in 2014 and 6.9% in 2011.
  - **10.1%** 2015
  - **8.3**% 2014
  - **6.9%** 2011
- → 4.2% took the test using a fee waiver, compared to 2.4% in 2014 and 2.8% of the class of 2011.



In Iowa, 12,449 students took an AP Exam in 2015, compared to 12,029 in 2014 and 9,609 in 2011.

- → 8.8% were underrepresented minority students, compared to 8.2% in 2014 and 5.2% in 2011.
  - 8.8% 2015
  - **8.2**% 2014
  - **5.2**% 2011
- → 13.5% were low-income students, compared to 11.4% in 2014 and 6.8% in 2011.

In Iowa, students took 19,787 AP Exams in 2015, compared to 18,860 in 2014 and 14,896 in 2011.



# PSAT/NMSQT°


In Iowa, 2,691 (70.2%) 10th-grade PSAT/NMSQT° takers in 2014 were on track for college readiness.

- → 36.1% of 10th-grade African American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 58.1% of 10th-grade Hispanic PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 53.8% of 10th-grade Native American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.



In Iowa, 5,104 (67.6%) 11th-grade PSAT/NMSQT° takers in 2014 were on track for college readiness.

- → 44.4% of 11th-grade African American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 46.2% of 11th-grade Hispanic PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 32.0% of 11th-grade Native American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.



In Iowa, 2,152 10th-grade PSAT/NMSQT takers in 2014 demonstrated potential to succeed in at least one AP course, including 1,246 in an AP STEM subject.


In Iowa, 96 underrepresented minority 10th-grade PSAT/NMSOT takers showed potential for AP success, including 53 in an AP STEM subject.



# SAT

In Iowa, 731 (74.1%) SAT takers in the class of 2015 met the SAT College and Career Readiness Benchmark.

- → 48.8% of African American SAT takers met the benchmark.
- → 50.0% of Hispanic SAT takers met the benchmark.





In Iowa, 8,013 students scored 3 or higher on an AP® Exam in 2015, compared to 7,566 in 2014 and 6,244 in 2011.

- → 64.4% of AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam in May 2015.
- → 36.7% of African American AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam.
- → 50.4% of Hispanic AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam.
- → 37.8% of Native American AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam.
