



Missouri

Increasing the number of students who graduate from high school ready for college and career is a unifying priority for educators from every state. The College Board believes that its programs can be a platform to expand access to opportunities through scholarships, challenging course work, fee waivers, and much more — and to propel students into college and career. Our programs — PSAT/NMSQT°, SAT°, and AP° — work together to provide actionable results, drive instructional next steps for individual students, and provide targeted policies for states and districts. Below is a summary of the 2014-15 PSAT/NMSOT, SAT, and AP participation and performance results in Missouri.1

ALL SCHOOLS' PARTICIPATION RESULTS

PSAT/NMSQT°

In 2014, 20,793 students benefited from taking the PSAT/NMSOT, compared to 21,822 in 2013 and 22,988 in 2010.

→ 12.9% were underrepresented minority students, compared to 12.2% in 2013 and 14.5% in 2010.

→ Last October, 10.2% of 10th-graders and 17.7% of 11th-graders took the PSAT/NMSQT.2

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SAT

In Missouri, 2.379 or 3.7% of students from the class of 2015 took the SAT, compared to 2,719 students (4.2%) in last year's graduating class and 3,222 (4.7%) in the class of 2011.

→ 12.5% were underrepresented minority students, compared to 12.2% in 2014 and 13.1% in 2011.

→ 5.1% took the test using a fee waiver, compared to 5.3% in 2014 and 3.5% of the class of 2011.



In Missouri, 24,164 students took an AP Exam in 2015, compared to 22,392 in 2014 and 18,057 in 2011.

- → 12.0% were underrepresented minority students, compared to 12.1% in 2014 and 12.2% in 2011.
 - **12.0**% 2015
 - **12.1**% 2014
 - **12.2**% 2011
- → 12.0% were low-income students, compared to 11.2% in 2014 and 11.1% in 2011.

In Missouri, students took 39,510 AP Exams in 2015, compared to 36,458 in 2014 and 29,352 in 2011.




ALL SCHOOLS' PERFORMANCE RESULTS

PSAT/NMSQT°


In Missouri, 5,867 (76.1%) 10th-grade PSAT/NMSQT® takers in 2014 were on track for college readiness.

- → 42.7% of 10th-grade African American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 58.5% of 10th-grade Hispanic PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → **78.0%** of 10th-grade Native American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.



In Missouri, 8,913 (70.4%) 11th-grade PSAT/NMSQT[®] takers in 2014 were on track for college readiness.

- → 33.0% of 11th-grade African American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 52.7% of 11th-grade Hispanic PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 62.3% of 11th-grade Native American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.



In Missouri, 4.841 10th-grade PSAT/NMSQT takers in 2014 demonstrated potential to succeed in at least one AP course, including 2,617 in an AP STEM subject.


In Missouri, 295 underrepresented minority 10th-grade PSAT/NMSOT takers showed potential for AP success, including 122 in an AP STEM subject.



SAT

In Missouri, 1,838 (77.3%) SAT takers in the class of 2015 met the SAT College and Career Readiness Benchmark.

- → 47.2% of African American SAT takers met the benchmark.
- → 59.8% of Hispanic SAT takers met the benchmark.
- → 66.7% of Native American SAT takers met the benchmark.





In Missouri, 15,196 students scored 3 or higher on an AP® Exam in 2015, compared to 14,477 in 2014 and 11,567 in 2011.

- → 62.9% of AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam in May 2015.
- → 25.2% of African American AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam.
- → 51.4% of Hispanic AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam.
- → 57.4% of Native American AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam.
