
Increasing the number of students who graduate from high school ready for college and career is a unifying priority for educators from every state. The College Board believes that its programs can be a platform to expand access to opportunities through scholarships, challenging course work, fee waivers, and much more — and to propel students into college and career. Our programs — PSAT/NMSQT°, SAT°, and AP° — work together to provide actionable results, drive instructional next steps for individual students, and provide targeted policies for states and districts. Below is a summary of the 2014-15 PSAT/NMSOT, SAT, and AP participation and performance results in New York.1

ALL SCHOOLS' PARTICIPATION RESULTS

PSAT/NMSQT[®]

In 2014, 266,284 students benefited from taking the PSAT/NMSOT, compared to 271,505 in 2013 and 279,313 in 2010.

→ 36.7% were underrepresented minority students, compared to 36.2% in 2013 and 35.8% in 2010.



→ Last October, 42.0% of 10th-graders and 65.4% of 11th-graders took the PSAT/NMSQT.2


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SAT

In New York, 153,543 or 74.9% of students from the class of 2015 took the SAT, compared to 154,809 students (76.3%) in last year's graduating class and 162,947 (76.4%) in the class of 2011.3

→ 33.1% were underrepresented minority students, compared to 32.3% in 2014 and 31.1% in 2011.




→ 33.9% took the test using a fee waiver, compared to 31.7% in 2014 and 27.0% of the class of 2011.



In New York, 153,623 students took an AP Exam in 2015, compared to 148,457 in 2014 and 133,871 in 2011.

→ 22.1% were underrepresented minority students, compared to 22.0% in 2014 and 19.5% in 2011.



→ 20.5% were low-income students, compared to 20.4% in 2014 and 17.5% in 2011.

In New York, students took 269,560 AP Exams in 2015, compared to 256,910 in 2014 and 228,147 in 2011.




ALL SCHOOLS' PERFORMANCE RESULTS

PSAT/NMSQT°


In New York, 36,938 (33.7%) 10th-grade PSAT/NMSQT[®] takers in 2014 were on track for college readiness.

- → 15.9% of 10th-grade African American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 16.1% of 10th-grade Hispanic PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 20.9% of 10th-grade Native American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.



In New York, 58,016 (39.8%) 11th-grade PSAT/NMSQT[®] takers in 2014 were on track for college readiness.

- → 17.0% of 11th-grade African American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 19.7% of 11th-grade Hispanic PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 25.3% of 11th-grade Native American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.



In New York, 25,914 10th-grade PSAT/NMSQT takers in 2014 demonstrated potential to succeed in at least one AP course, including 12,393 in an AP STEM subject.


In New York, 4,020 underrepresented minority 10th-grade PSAT/NMSOT takers showed potential for AP success, including 1,256 in an AP STEM subject.



SAT

In New York, 60,553 (39.4%) SAT takers in the class of 2015 met the SAT College and Career Readiness Benchmark.

- → 15.0% of African American SAT takers met the benchmark.
- → 19.2% of Hispanic SAT takers met the benchmark.
- → 23.9% of Native American SAT takers met the benchmark.





In New York, 100,481 students scored 3 or higher on an AP® Exam in 2015, compared to 99,366 in 2014 and 88,205 in 2011.

- → 65.4% of AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam in May 2015.
- > 37.2% of African American AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam.
- → 55.4% of Hispanic AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam.
- → 49.6% of Native American AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam.
