



South Dakota

Increasing the number of students who graduate from high school ready for college and career is a unifying priority for educators from every state. The College Board believes that its programs can be a platform to expand access to opportunities through scholarships, challenging course work, fee waivers, and much more — and to propel students into college and career. Our programs — PSAT/NMSQT°, SAT°, and AP° — work together to provide actionable results, drive instructional next steps for individual students, and provide targeted policies for states and districts. Below is a summary of the 2014-15 PSAT/NMSOT, SAT, and AP participation and performance results in South Dakota.1

ALL SCHOOLS' PARTICIPATION RESULTS

PSAT/NMSQT[®]

In 2014, 2,860 students benefited from taking the PSAT/NMSQT, compared to 3,006 in 2013 and 3,151 in 2010.

- → 5.4% were underrepresented minority students, compared to 4.9% in 2013 and 4.1% in 2010.
 - **5.4**% 2014
 - **4.9**% 2013
 - **4.1**% 2010
- → Last October, 5.4% of 10th-graders and 23.7% of 11th-graders took the PSAT/NMSQT.2

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SAT

In South Dakota, 238 or 2.8% of students from the class of 2015 took the SAT, compared to 250 students (2.9%) in last year's graduating class and 306 (3.4%) in the class of 2011.3

- → 8.4% were underrepresented minority students, compared to 9.2% in 2014 and 9.5% in 2011.
 - **8.4**% 2015
 - **9.2**% 2014
 - 9.5% 2011
- → 5.5% took the test using a fee waiver, compared to 7.6% in 2014 and 3.6% of the class of 2011.



In South Dakota, 2,785 students took an AP Exam in 2015, compared to 2,756 in 2014 and 2,481 in 2011.

- → 7.1% were underrepresented minority students, compared to 6.0% in 2014 and 4.9% in 2011.
 - **7.1**% 2015
 - **6.0**% 2014
 - **4.9**% 2011
- → 6.6% were low-income students, compared to 6.2% in 2014 and 5.4% in 2011.

In South Dakota, students took 4,644 AP Exams in 2015, compared to 4,708 in 2014 and 4,207 in 2011.



ALL SCHOOLS' PERFORMANCE RESULTS


PSAT/NMSQT°

In South Dakota, 445 (78.3%) 10th-grade PSAT/NMSQT® takers in 2014 were on track for college readiness.

→ 87.5% of 10th-grade Hispanic PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.

In South Dakota, 1,386 (62.2%) 11th-grade PSAT/NMSQT® takers in 2014 were on track for college readiness.

- → 40.0% of 11th-grade African American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 54.3% of 11th-grade Hispanic PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 31.3% of 11th-grade Native American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.



In South Dakota, 370 10th-grade PSAT/NMSOT takers in 2014 demonstrated potential to succeed in at least one AP course, including 189 in an AP STEM subject.

In South Dakota, 13 underrepresented minority 10th-grade PSAT/NMSOT takers showed potential for AP success, including 5 in an AP STEM subject.



SAT

In South Dakota, 176 (73.9%) SAT takers in the class of 2015 met the SAT College and Career Readiness Benchmark.



In South Dakota, 1,824 students scored 3 or higher on an AP® Exam in 2015, compared to 1,841 in 2014 and 1,666 in 2011.

→ 65.5% of AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam in May 2015.

- → 51.9% of African American AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam.
- → 52.9% of Hispanic AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam.
- → 47.4% of Native American AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam.
