




Increasing the number of students who graduate from high school ready for college and career is a unifying priority for educators from every state. The College Board believes that its programs can be a platform to expand access to opportunities through scholarships, challenging course work, fee waivers, and much more — and to propel students into college and career. Our programs — PSAT/NMSQT°, SAT°, and AP° — work together to provide actionable results, drive instructional next steps for individual students, and provide targeted policies for states and districts. Below is a summary of the 2014-15 PSAT/NMSOT, SAT, and AP participation and performance results in Washington.<sup>1</sup>

#### ALL SCHOOLS' PARTICIPATION RESULTS

## PSAT/NMSQT°

In 2014, 83,217 students benefited from taking the PSAT/NMSOT, compared to 77,057 in 2013 and 57,467 in 2010.

→ 20.7% were underrepresented minority students, compared to 19.2% in 2013 and 17.1% in 2010.



→ Last October, 43.0% of 10th-graders and 48.8% of 11th-graders took the PSAT/NMSQT.2


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### SAT

In Washington, 44,423 or 66.2% of students from the class of 2015 took the SAT, compared to 41,277 students (63.1%) in last year's graduating class and 38,972 (55.2%) in the class of 2011.3

→ 19.3% were underrepresented minority students, compared to 17.5% in 2014 and 14.2% in 2011.



→ 14.4% took the test using a fee waiver, compared to 16.5% in 2014 and 14.0% of the class of 2011.



In Washington, 50,268 students took an AP Exam in 2015, compared to 47,146 in 2014 and 39,328 in 2011.

→ 13.3% were underrepresented minority students, compared to 13.4% in 2014 and 11.5% in 2011.

→ 18.8% were low-income students, compared to 16.7% in 2014 and 16.4% in 2011.

In Washington, students took 84,866 AP Exams in 2015, compared to 79,567 in 2014 and 66,242 in 2011.



# PSAT/NMSQT°


In Washington, 17,500 (46.8%) 10th-grade PSAT/NMSQT<sup>®</sup> takers in 2014 were on track for college readiness.

- → 18.3% of 10th-grade African American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 19.2% of 10th-grade Hispanic PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 24.1% of 10th-grade Native American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.



In Washington, 19,705 (48.6%) 11th-grade PSAT/NMSQT° takers in 2014 were on track for college readiness.

- → 20.6% of 11th-grade African American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 20.8% of 11th-grade Hispanic PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.
- → 30.9% of 11th-grade Native American PSAT/NMSQT takers met the benchmark.



In Washington, 12,928 10th-grade PSAT/NMSQT takers in 2014 demonstrated potential to succeed in at least one AP course, including 6,674 in an AP STEM subject.


In Washington, 919 underrepresented minority 10th-grade PSAT/NMSOT takers showed potential for AP success, including 320 in an AP STEM subject.



# SAT

In Washington, 19,458 (43.8%) SAT takers in the class of 2015 met the SAT College and Career Readiness Benchmark.

- → 18.0% of African American SAT takers met the benchmark.
- → 18.5% of Hispanic SAT takers met the benchmark.
- → 30.1% of Native American SAT takers met the benchmark.





In Washington, 30,739 students scored 3 or higher on an AP® Exam in 2015, compared to 29,171 in 2014 and 24,354 in 2011.

- → 61.2% of AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam in May 2015.
- → 35.9% of African American AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam.
- → 43.9% of Hispanic AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam.
- → 41.9% of Native American AP Exam takers scored 3 or higher on at least one AP Exam.
