




HOW DO WE START?

- In about 1 minute I'll ask each of you to stand, move around the room and find a seat at one of the six tables.

- Paper on which to write, doodle thoughts and ideas as you engage and listen
- A host who will remain at each table to share with a new group of participants aspects of the previous conversations and be responsible for debriefing at the end of the Café and,
- We'll do two fifteen minute rounds.
