It may help to make a list of characteristics that are important to you, beginning with the top priority. Some features to consider:

SIZE

- Do you want a big school with a wide variety of majors and state-of-the-art research facilities?
- · Or do you want a smaller school with a strong sense of community where you know everyone by name?

LOCATION

· Do you prefer the city, the country, or somewhere in between?

DISTANCE FROM HOME

· How far from home do you want to venture?

HOUSING OPTIONS

What types of housing does the school offer? Dorm?
 Apartment? Off campus?

AVAILABLE MAJORS AND CLASSES

 Does the school offer a variety of courses and majors you're interested in?

STUDENT BODY MAKEUP

· How geographically/racially/politically diverse is the student body?

EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

 Does the school offer outlets for the activities you're passionate about?

CAMPUS ATMOSPHERE

· Is the campus high energy or laid back? Do a lot of students go home on weekends or do most stay on campus?
