Who We Serve - The College Board:

- Reaches more than 7 million students, 23,000 high schools and approximately 3,800 colleges.
- Administered more than 3 million SAT exams in the 2010 academic year. Over the last decade, participation by minority students has increased by 78 percent.
- Serves a community of approximately 130,000 AP teachers and administered more than 3.4 million AP Exams in 2010-11.
- Maintains relationships with more than 900 key school districts across the country; we reach more than 54 percent (about 9,700) of total U.S. public school districts through PSAT/NMSQT alone.

CAPE Goals


- By the end of Year 3, all participating schools with:
 - 0-4 AP courses will offer 5 or more AP courses AND increase the number of students participating in new AP course offerings based on AP Potential results
 - 5-8 AP courses will increase the number of students who participate in the existing AP program and will selectively add new AP courses to meet the needs of students with high AP potential in specific disciplines
- 100% of targeted AP teachers in participating CAPE schools will attend an AP Summer Institute
- By the end of Year 3, school sites will have established their AP participation and performance growth goals for students

"A recent analysis of California's high school students from the 2011 PSAT shows that over 168,000 students have the potential to succeed in at least one AP course; unfortunately many of the schools they attend do not offer those AP courses. This pilot is an attempt to help these students access the AP course for which they have the highest likelihood of success."

AP Basics

Advanced Placement Program® (AP®) courses are college-level courses offered in high school. AP courses reflect what is taught in top introductory college courses.

At the end of course, students take **AP Exams**—standardized exams that measure how well students have mastered college-level course work.

Students who do well on AP Exams can earn credit and/or placement into advanced courses in college.

Key Benefits of AP

- Students have the opportunity to receive **credit and/or advanced placement** in college, and earn academic scholarships and awards. Most four-year colleges and universities in the U.S. have credit or placement policies.
- AP enhances a student's college admission portfolio.
 Three-quarters of admission officers report that AP is "very helpful" or "extremely helpful" in considering students for admission.
- Students who take AP Exams and score a 3 or higher typically experience greater academic success and college graduation rates than non-AP students.

Key Benefits of AP

 AP courses establish a college-level standard in secondary schools that is measured through a global assessment designed and scored by college faculty.

 AP courses expose college-bound students to the amounts of homework, study skills, and habits of mind essential for success in college courses.

AP and College Success

A recent study* showed that students who earned a 3, 4, or 5 on the AP Exam had higher first-year college grade point averages and were more likely to return for the second year of college than non-AP students of similar ability.

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AP Credit Expands Students' Options

College credit earned through AP Exams allows students to move into upper-level college courses sooner, pursue a double major, and gain time to study and travel abroad.

"As a freshman, I was able to skip general education requirements and head straight into the higher-level classes I wanted to take. Taking AP Exams literally saved me semesters of time."—Brent Wiese, University of Iowa





AP Helps Students Graduate on Time...

Students who take AP courses and exams are much more likely than their peers to complete a college degree on time.

- Only one in four students who enter college complete a bachelor's degree in four years.*
- A recent study** showed that students taking AP courses and exams were much more likely to earn a college degree in four years.

For example, AP English Literature students had four-year college graduation rates that were **62% higher** than students that had not taken AP English Literature.

... and Save Money

- Students who take five years or more to graduate can spend nearly \$22,000 for each additional year in college.
 - The typical college cost per year for a four-year public institution for students who live on campus is \$21,447*
 - Cost includes tuition and fees, room and board, books and supplies, transportation, and other expenses



AP Federal Funding

The U.S. Department of Education has notified states that they now have additional funds to cover the costs of 2012 AP Exams for eligible low-income students. When combined with the increased College Board subsidy, these funds will make all AP Exams \$5 for your school's low-income students in May 2012.

Eligibility criteria:

Family income does not exceed 185 percent of the federal poverty income level. Student is eligible for (but does not have to participate in) the Free and Reduced Price Meal Program.

AP Federal Funding

AP Test Amount Total: \$87

Cost Description Breakdown:

\$26 - College Board fee reduction: The College Board credits the school \$26 per AP Exam.

\$8 - School administrative fee waiver: The school declines to collect an administrative fee of \$8 per AP Exam.



\$5 - Student contribution: The student pays \$5 per AP Exam.

\$48 - CDE funding: Pursuant to federal funding conditions, the California Department of Education (CDE) will pay the College Board directly up to \$48 per AP Exam taken by an income-eligible student. Please note that the CDE funding amount may be prorated depending on the amount of the 2012 federal grant awarded to the CDE. In the event that the CDE receives federal funding that is not sufficient to cover all eligible exam costs, schools and districts would be responsible for covering the shortfall.

Please inform eligible students and their parents about the restored funding and encourage those who opted out of taking the exams due to loss of funding to reconsider taking the exams in May. If you have already ordered and received your AP Exams, you can place an additional order for students who will now be able to take the exam thanks to the restored funding.

About the CAPE Invited Schools

- Represent 50 counties –Urban and Rural
- Roughly half (99) of the qualifying schools offer 4 or fewer AP subjects
- About 30 qualifying schools offer no AP courses
- Half of qualifying schools have 50% or more underrepresented students
- Half of qualifying schools have 50% or more low reduced lunch





Participating CAPE Schools will:

- Use AP Potential, an online tool, to identify students with the potential to benefit from and excel in AP courses
- Determine which AP courses should be added to meet student needs
- Invite students with high AP potential to enroll in new and existing AP courses
- Receive scholarships from the College Board to attend an AP Summer Institute



Participating CAPE Schools will:


- Be eligible for supplemental funding from the College Board and DonorsChoose.org for textbooks and other essential materials for AP courses
- Receive ongoing support and technical assistance from the College Board to ensure successful implementation
- Complete AP Course Audit Process.





What is AP Potential™?

- AP Potential is a free, Web-based tool that allows schools to generate rosters of students who are likely to score a 3 or better on a given AP Exam
 - Designed to help you increase access to AP and to ensure that no student who has the chance of succeeding in AP is overlooked
 - Based on research showing that PSAT/NMSQT scores are stronger predictors of students' AP Exam scores than more traditional factors such as high school grades and grades in previous samediscipline course work



AP Potential™

- Identify students who may be prepared for AP based on PSAT/NMSQT results
- Obtain a roster of potential AP students by name and suggested AP course
- Promote access to challenging course work by identifying the "diamond-in-the-rough" scholars at your school
- Increase equity by relying on data-driven models to find additional candidates for AP potential
- Prepare useful data that principals and teachers can use to expand AP programs, add courses, or increase enrollment in current AP offerings

Define the Pool


A pool reflects the probability of students receiving an AP^{\otimes} Exam score of 3, 4, or 5. For example, if you set your pool at 60, your roster includes all students whose probability of receiving an AP Exam score of 3, 4, or 5 is anywhere between 60% and 100%. - Teachers will sign a Letter of Commitment (that they will attend the PD) and will select an APSI and register. APSI will receive tuition funding directly from CAPE Access Program.

How will the CAPE program be evaluated?

Short term

- Increased student participation in AP among participating schools
- Students' performance on AP exams
- Implementation of new classes

Long term

- Increased high school graduation rates
- Increased college enrollment and graduation rates
- Choices in major fields of study



What is a College Board–endorsed AP or Pre-AP Summer Institute?

 The AP and Pre-AP Summer Institutes are subject-specific professional development opportunities. They provide teachers with the support and training needed to teach AP courses and to utilize Pre-AP teaching strategies.
 Teachers from around the world come together at these institutes to exchange ideas and information about AP courses and exams.





What can I expect at a College Board–endorsed summer institute?

- Topics that are often covered in summer institute sessions include:
 - AP courses: goals, objectives, content, resources, bibliographies, and equipment
 - The AP Examination: how it is developed and graded
 - Syllabi, lesson plans, and assignments
 - How to refresh and improve existing AP courses
 - Recent changes in AP Course Descriptions
 - Strategies for teaching students at beginning or intermediate levels
 - Vertical teaming

AP Course Audit Overview

What is the AP Course Audit?

- Created at the request of secondary school and university members of the College Board, the AP Course Audit is designed to:
 - Provide teachers and administrators with clear guidelines on curricular and resource requirements that must be in place for AP courses.
 - Give colleges and universities confidence that AP courses are designed to meet the same clearly articulated college-level criteria across secondary schools.

Who should complete the AP Course Audit?

- All schools wishing to label a course "AP" must submit the subjectspecific AP Course Audit form and the course syllabus for each teacher of that AP course.
- It is the school's responsibility to ensure that the AP courses listed on students' transcripts, in course catalogs, and on the school's Web site are authorized and annually renewed through the AP Course Audit process.
- Applies to classroom courses as well as online or distance learning courses.
